

1. Winlow House Negative available
 Was known as the Minnesota College Hospital prior to 1888. As far as we can determine this building, while used by one of the groups which surrendered its charter to form "the Medical Department of the University of Minnesota", was never used by the university.
2. Minnesota Hospital College Negatives available
 Used from 1888-1892. Later became the University Free Dispensary, and still later became Asbury Hospital.
3. Medical Hall
 Built 1892.
 Name changed to Millard Hall, 1906
 Name changed to Pharmacy Building, 1913
 Name changed to Wulling Hall, 1942
 Dedicated by Sir William Osler, October 4, 1892. See James Eckman, "Osler in Minnesota" Minnesota Medicine 31:776-787, July, 1948.
4. Chemistry Building
 Built 1890.
 Became Minnesota Union 1914
 Name changed to U.S.S. Minnesota, 1942
 Name changed to Nicholson Hall, 1945
 To our knowledge this building was never used for medical classes or labs.
5. Medical Sciences Building
 Built 1896.
 Name changed to Dentistry Building, 1912
 Name changed to Westbrook Hall, 1932
6. Laboratory of Medical Chemistry
 Also called the "Bowling Alley" or the "Sheep Shed"
 Stood approximately where Johnston Hall now stands.
 Built 1893
 Name changed to Central Storehouse, 1914
 Wrecked, 1924
7. Eddy Hall
 Was originally the Mechanical Arts Building. To our knowledge this was never a medical building.

8. Westbrook Hall was never the State Board of Health Building-- see item 5.
9. Dr. Hewitt had an office in Westbrook originally but the Public Health and Pathology Building, which was erected in 1907, was the first section of the present State Board of Health--Psychology Building. This was the last medical building built north of Washington Avenue.
9. The old Anatomy Building (erected 1900, burned ca.1910) stood next to Wulling Hall. Present Pharmacy Greenhouse built on its foundation.
10. There was also a clinic located across the river on Seven Corners at 1810 Washington Avenue South. This building was erected in 1899 and I believe still stands.

Housed the Medical School through 1912
Name changed to Millard Hall, 1906
Fire, December 1909 and February 1912
Name changes: Millard Hall 1906
Pharmacy Building 1913
Wulling Hall 1942
2. Laboratory of Medical Chemistry built 1893
Housed medical labs to 1912
Central storehouse until razed in 1924
3. Medical Sciences Building built 1896
Used by medicine, dentistry, pharmacy
No medical classes after 1912
Name changes: Dentistry building, 1912
Washbrook Hall, 1932
4. Anatomy Building built 1900 - burned 1910
Pharmacy greenhouse constructed on foundation and lower walls
5. Public Health and Pathology Building built 1907
Contained pathology, bacteriology, public health, and
the Dean's office, as well as State Board of Health.
Department of Public Health and Pathology remained there
until 1920

3. Millard Hall - built 1912
4. Hospital ~~Science~~^{ervice} Building, built 1915, connected with
Elliot Hospital.
5. Todd Memorial Hospital, built 1924
6. George Chase Christian Memorial Cancer Hospital - built 1925
7. Minnesota Hospital and Home for Crippled Children (Eustis),
built 1928
8. Health ~~Science~~^{ervice} (old) built 1929
Reverted to hospital use, 1950
9. Outpatient Department, built 1928
10. Medical Science Building (dental unit), built 1932
Name change: Oyre Hall 1950
11. Psychopathic Hospital, built 1936, on roof of Todd and
Christian wings.
12. Students' Health Service, built 1950
13. Variety Club Heart Hospital, built 1951
14. Elias P. Lyon Laboratories, built 1954
15. Mayo Memorial Building, built 1954
16. Cardio-Vascular Laboratory, 1958
Constructed by remodelling a residence at 305 Union.

17. Masonic Memorial Hospital, built 1958
18. VFW Cancer Research Center, built 1959
19. Diehl Hall - built 1960
20. Jackson - Ovre Addition, built 1960
Houses N.T. Bell Laboratories and Peter J. Brekhus (dentistry) wing.
